As a young girl Jeanette attended classes under Miss Helen Moran at the Dunedin technical college and was already an accomplished stitcher by the time she joined the guild. The guild helped her expand her knowledge and her skills she said.

Jeanette has always enjoyed doing ecumenical work and was invited to do an alter frontal in the 1960's.





Since then much of her work has been for the church and include 27 stoles for clergy as well as alter fronts and banners. Jeanette regards ecumenical work as her favourite style.

DESIGN Part 2 – Nicky van der Jaght





REQUIREMENTS

Journal from Design Part 1 containing your ideas scoped from pictures, fabric, lace, stones, leaves.

Stitching materials

Anything needed to transition from journal to fabric. Fabric (variety), threads, beads and anything you may wish to embellish your design when putting it all together.

You are welcome to join this class.

If starting out in the Design Part 1 stage you will need Journal A4 or A5 – Artists Visual Diary Pencil - HB

Objects to use for drawing e.g. pictures, fabric, lace, stones, leaves, anything you can get ideas from.

Nicki will supply some art materials.

Johnston

Shadow work is a very pretty but easy form of embroidery, often used on giftwear, babywear and other delicate clothing such as lingerie or fine shirts.

If you haven't already put your name down for this class please ring Peggy at 455-3304 or e-mail peggyjohnston@clear.net.nz to order a kit.

You will need to bring: \$6.50 for kit

A 6 or 7 inch hoop. It is necessary to bind both rings of the hoop with tape to keep the very fine fabric taut.

24 or 26 tapestry needle Scissors, Pins, Lead pencil

REQUIREMENTS

- 1. ½ square dark green felt.
- 2. 1/4 square red felt.
- 3. Small piece of brown felt.
- 4. 1 bell (supplied with pattern)
- 5. Cereal box cardboard.
- 6. 17 small green or gold beads.
- 7. Green thread (stranded cotton or sewing thread).
- 8. Red, green or grey string.
- 9. Red satin ribbon, width 2.5 cm by 40cm long.
- 10. Double ended push clothes peg.

Embroidery books in the 16-17th century


In 1530 the first embroidery pattern books were being published in England and were often copies of foreign works (Brooks, 1955, p.24). In Augsburg, Germany in 1523 Johan Schönsperger the Younger published one of the first pattern books *Furm-oder Modelbuchlein* (little shape or pattern book) which contained 24 plates of geometrical and floral designs meant to be used for embroidery on clothing. Schönsperger the Younger did not market the book to professional clothiers, rather to female amateur embroiders. It was so successful that the following year he published another pattern book and other publishers took notice. Pattern books began to be published in Venice, Augsburg, and Lyon, mostly using pirated patterns. The first Italian pattern book stole many designs from Schönsperger the Younger's *Furm-oder Modelbuchlein* but also included the first printed patterns with Islamic interlace pattern (Snodin, 27-28).

One popular embroidery book from this era is Giovanni Antonio Tagliente's *Opera nuova* che insegna a le donne a cuscire ... laqual e intitolata Esempio di raccammi (A New Work that Teaches Women how to Sew ... Entitled "Samples of Embroidery")

The image below shows similar Islamic designs adorning the under jacket and collar of Henry VIII painting by Hans Holbein the Younger, 1536. Clicking the image will open the file in a new window where you can zoom in and view the designs closer.



Austerity during the late Tudor and Stuart eras in England allowed for a surge in popularity of embroidery. The most dominate designs were flora and fauna and religious figural Christian designs (Watts, 2010).
