LIFE MEMBER, Otago Embroiderers' Guild

Jan Wilson



Educated at King Edward Technical College where she studied embroidery under Miss Moran, Jan became a Guild member in the 1960's.

In 1970's Jan completed the City and Guilds of London course under local tutor Mrs Allen, achieving Part 1 with Merit. Jan continued with Part 2 as a distance student gaining Distinction. During this time she was a part time tutor at Otago Polytechnic.

By the 1980's Jan was involved with a number of large panels throughout the city. In 1981 the Annunciation Panel for Holy Name Church, was designed and stitched by Jan. The Library Banner for the Rare Book Room of the Dunedin Public Library, designed by Jan, and stitched by guild members in 1983.

In 1986, Invermay Agricultural research Centre commissioned her to design and embroider a panel for their new complex.

Jan also designed a long tapestry for First Church, worked in wool by 19 women, supervised over 6 years by Jan.



Until 1992, Jan lectured at Otago Polytechnic School of Art and

Department of Community Studies, when she was granted a QE2 Travel Grant and accepted a place at Goldsmiths College, London. Jan gained Postgraduate Diploma in 1993, followed by another year when she gained her Master of Arts in Visual Arts from London University with Distinction.



Back in Dunedin, and a position at Otago Polytechnic, Jan continued with her interests in guild projects, private commissions, and curating exhibitions e.g. *"Always Busy with a Needle"* in 2002 with Sean Brosnahan, celebrating work of some of our founding guild members. Another was organising an exhibition for the ANZEG Conference in Dunedin in !996...Intertext, textile art A4 size posted to Dunedin from overseas, all mounted on board and all for sale.

Conservation work and producing a data catalogue for Larnach Castle artefacts, conservation of frocks for Otago Settlers Museum for Fabulous Frocks Exhibitions 1 and 2 are some of the many tasks she has been involved in.

As if that is not enough she became an approved tutor for City and Guilds, London, and has guided a number of guild members and others through this interesting course.

Jan is still prepared to set challenges for us like the display at the Botanic Gardens for World Embroidery Day. She is always encouraging when asked for advice. Jan is a valuable guild member.

Of interest

New Zealand Christmas Symbol



The pohutukawa tree (*Metrosideros excelsa*) with its crimson flower has become an established part of the New Zealand Christmas tradition. This iconic Kiwi Christmas tree, which often features on greeting cards and in poems and songs, has become an important symbol for New Zealanders at home and abroad.

In 1833 the missionary Henry Williams described holding service under a 'wide spreading pohutukawa'. The first known published reference to the pohutukawa as a Christmas tree came in 1857 when 'flowers of the scarlet *Pohutukawa*, or "Christmas tree" formed part of table decorations at a feast put on by Ngāpuhi leader Eruera Patuone. Several years later Austrian geologist Ferdinand von Hochstetter noted that settlers referred to it as such. The pohutukawa, he observed, 'about Christmas ... are full of charming ... blossoms'; 'the settler decorates his church and dwellings with its lovely branches'. Other 19th-century references described the pohutukawa tree as the 'Settlers Christmas tree' and 'Antipodean holly'.

In 1941 Army Chaplain Ted Forsman composed a pohutukawa carol in which he made reference to 'your red tufts, our snow'. Forsman was serving in the Libyan Desert at the time, hardly the surroundings normally associated with the image of a fiery red pohutukawa tree. Many of his fellow New Zealanders, though, would have instantly identified with the image. Today many school children sing about how 'the native Christmas tree of Aotearoa' fills their hearts 'with aroha'.

Pohutukawa and its cousin rata also hold a prominent place in Maori tradition. Legends tell of Tawhaki, a young Maori warrior, who attempted to find heaven to seek help in avenging the death of his father. He fell to earth and the crimson flowers are said to represent his blood.

A gnarled, twisted pohutukawa on the windswept cliff top at Cape Reinga, the northern tip of New Zealand, has become of great significance to many New Zealanders. For Maori this small, venerated pohutukawa is known as 'the place of leaping'. It is from here that the spirits of the dead begin their journey to their traditional homeland of Hawaiki. From this point the spirits leap off the headland and climb down the roots of the 800-year-old tree, descending into the underworld on their return journey.
