A message from our President, Mary Flaherty

This week I have had a lot of positive comments about our mid-winter Christmas Day embroidering decorations, listening to Christmas music and enjoying the display of Christmas decorations. Members enjoyed a bowl of soup for lunch and generally had a very happy day. It made me think about the sense of community that is so important to many of our Guild members. Some of our members have had challenging issues to deal with and spending a day with us embroidering is the first step taken as they become more confident and move back into community, often on their own.

The announcement that the OEG will be hosting the 2024 Conference was also exciting news. There are new regulations around the organisation of conferences and when these become available you will all be emailed a copy. The OEG is responsible for electing a convenor and committee so at this stage do think about whether you would like to be involved.

The 6th panel in the 'Suffrage and Beyond' exhibition commemorating Janet Frame has been formally offered to Toitu. This becomes part of our permanent collection joining the five previous banners also made by Guild members for the earlier 100th anniversary of Women's Suffrage in New Zealand. The Guild would like to give a special thank you to Claire Orbell for all her work in this area.

Last weekend I went to the 'Style and Substance' exhibition at the Dunedin Art Gallery. It was divided into six themes – history painting, portraits, genre painting, landscapes, still life and animal paintings. I really enjoyed it as there were paintings on display I hadn't seen before. I especially enjoyed Martha Jury's Crewel embroidered panels mounted as a screen and George Hicks's triptych presenting three sketches for larger paintings 'Guide of Childhood, Companion of Manhood and Comfort of Old Age. Do make an effort to go and see it if you have time.

Shona Johnstone

It is with sadness that we report on the death of one of our Guild's foundation members, Shona Johnstone (nee Hogan) in her 93rd year. Before heading to London in the 1940s Shona studied and later taught at the Dunedin School of Art. During her time overseas she studied at both the Royal School of Needlework and the London School of Weaving. After her return from London she returned to teaching before marrying Peter Johnstone in 1951. Peter was an All Black Captain and there is a park in Mosgiel named for him. Shona also taught at King Edward College during periods when Miss Moran was unavailable due to her looking after her mother.

As well as being instrumental in the setting up of the Otago Embroiderers' Guild Mrs Johnstone was also an inaugural member of the Otago Spinners and Weavers Guild. She served as the Embroiderers' Guild president and was very involved with the public embroidery works around Dunedin including the project stitching the kneelers for the Hospital Chapel and a large embroidered piece for the then Otago Saving bank in Moray Place. Sadly the piece made for the bank went missing when the changeover to Westpac Bank occurred. Enquiries about the embroidery were made by the Guild but it has never been found.

Mrs Johnstone lived in Gladstone Road, Mosgiel for many years and later moved to Wanaka. While living in Wanaka she designed what is now known as the Southern Lakes Tartan, using colours of the Central Otago landscape and inspired by the mountains with snow-capped peaks, golden tussocks, and the blue of the lake (blue, black, light brown and white). The tartan was officially registered in Scotland in 2016 under the Scottish Register of Tartans Act 2008. The tartan was officially launched at the Great Glenorchy Getaway Day on 20 May 2017. When the Wanaka Pipe Band needed new uniforms they chose Shona's tartan for them. Shona arranged for the fabric to be woven in Perthshire in Scotland. One of the highlights of Shona's life was when the newly outfitted band arrived at her home in full dress to play for her.

Shona's last attendance at our Guild was at Toitu when the formation of Tapestry Trust was formalised. She has left a lasting legacy with our Guild and in Central Otago.



Terms and conditions:

Applications will be accepted from any current financial member of the Otago Embroiderers' Guild.

The scholarship will cover:

- Registration
- · Class Fees
- · Lunches each day
- A billet in the Wanaka region or \$50 towards accommodation per night for 2 nights.
- Assistance with finding transport will also be offered.

The recipient of the scholarship is expected to:

- pay for their class materials. Supplies from the Guild's store can be used.
- cover any other meal cost and top up accommodation where necessary.
- enter their class work at the following Guild meeting "Show and Tell" table and at the OEG exhibition.

Notes re Scholarship:

- The decision of the guild committee is final and no correspondence will be entered into.
- If you are unsuccessful, please feel free to re-apply next year.
- The successful applicant will not be eligible to re-apply for the scholarship for a period of 5 years.
- Members who have independently attended the Wanaka embroidery school within the last five years are ineligible to apply.
- Current members of the Otago Embroiderer's Guild Committee are ineligible to apply.

The Power of Poetry

Embroider a line or lines from a published poet and then embroider your interpretation to represent the imagery in the lines. The piece must be titled – An extract from (title of the poem) by (poet).

This can be presented in different ways to fit within a 5 inch (13cm) by 8 inch (20cm) radius. It can be much smaller provided it fits within the measurements provided. It could be a plaque, or a needle case, or a small box or a little book. That is entirely your choice.

e.g. An extract from 'Hunger' by Laurence Binyon

I am Hunger

Embroider examples of physical, mental or spiritual hunger.

Or

An extract from 'To Autumn' by John Keats

Seasons of mist and mellow fruitfulness

Close bosom friend of the maturing sun

Embroider images of autumn literally or figuratively.

Children's poetry, humorous poetry and NZ poetry are wonderful sources of inspiration.

I wasn't much of a stitcher as a child, the only piece I remember doing was a cross-stitch when I was recovering from an illness; I must have been about 14. I still have it...somewhere! I started smocking when Anna was born and it all snowballed from there. I have always sewn, mum taught me and she was a fantastic tailor and very patiently unpicked all my mistakes.

When our family shifted to Dunedin in 2007, I knew only one other person here, Ingrid Emerson and it was Ingrid who took me under her wing and introduced me to the Guild. I found a friendly and embrac-

ing Guild, much like a reflection of the Southern community in general. With people so willing to offer support and knowledge it has formed an important part of my life and hope it will continue always to be so.

My stitching repertoire has now extended to include many forms, from beading, crazy patch, and free form surface stitching and beyond. There are still many more ideas I have yet to explore but trying disparately to finish more than I start; sound familiar?

I saw my time as president from 2012 to 2104 as a great way to give something back. It is a service that I fully embraced and I really appreciated the great support that I had from my fabulous committee. No, there was not much time left to do your own stitching, but it was all about what we could do for others and be a bit of a politician at the same time. It really made me fele like I belong here.
