Please come along and enjoy an evening of fun at the Quiz. See how you go and how much you know. Spot prizes and fun to be had. Thursday 28th November after the AGM.


## **Around the World Stitch Along**

This month there are three parts available to pick up and stitch over the Christmas period. Including a visit home to New Zealand in Part 12. I have seen some gorgeous stitching of these pieces at Guild. Well done I love how different they look. They are turning out beautifully. Keep up the good stitching.

#### Part 10


This month remain in China to stitch Pekinese stitch. We then move on to India to work Indian Herringbone. Finally we cross the sea to Sri Lanka and work Ceylon stitch.



#### Part 11

This month move on to Japan to work Japanese stitch and Japanese darning. Then we cross the sea to Australia to work a Wessex Stitchery stitch invented by Gay Eaton, which she named Victoria. <u>Supplementary note to our New Zealand stitchers</u>

A number of you have written to us pointing out that Gay Eaton was a New Zealander and not Australian. Of course you are right. However, she named some of the stitches she devised after places in Australia, as well as the many others after places in New Zealand, and that's where we go next month.



#### Part 12

This month we stay in Australia to work another of Gay Eaton's stitches—Bendigo stitch. Then we move to her home of New Zealand and work Dunstan stitch and Dunedin stitch.

#### The Power of Poetry

Embroider a line or lines from a published poet and then embroider your interpretation to represent the imagery in the lines. The piece must be titled – An extract from (title of the poem) by (poet).

This can be presented in different ways to fit within a 5 inch (13cm) by 8 inch (20cm) radius. It can be much smaller provided it fits within the measurements provided. It could be a plaque, or a needle case, or a small box or a little book. That is entirely your choice. e.g. An extract from 'Hunger' by Laurence Binyon

I am Hunger

Embroider examples of physical, mental or spiritual hunger.

Or

An extract from 'To Autumn' by John Keats

Seasons of mist and mellow fruitfulness

Close bosom friend of the maturing sun

Embroider images of autumn literally or figuratively.

Children's poetry, humorous poetry and NZ poetry are wonderful sources of inspiration.
