Over the years and our many shifts, the Guild Archives have become a real muddle. The Hocken Library have accepted our correspondence (although I think I have found two folders I have missed) The collection comprises a really interesting history of the Guild - past exhibitions, catalogues, correspondence from other Guilds and clubs. It is therefore a snapshot on the wider creative community as well as the Guild. Being the second Guild to be created in New Zealand, the first beginning in Southland, we are therefore one of the first, and one of the largest in New Zealand. My problem is that, alt-

hough I feel a real need to save and collate these records my training is not in this area, and I fear my efforts may not make for a rational organization of this material.

So, is there anyone in the Guild who has the expertise to help put "method into madness" and so preserve in a methodical manner what is a really important record of the beginnings of the Embroiderers' Guilds in New Zealand?

THE MT FELIX TAPESTRIES

The Mt Felix tapestries toured the country in 2018 and 2019. In March and April last year some of our guild members and others had the chance to work on two additional panels at Otago Settlers Museum. One was the story of Jimmy McNish who was from Otago and started the RSA choir here. The other was about Clutha McKenzie who was blinded in World War One and went on to work hard to develop the Foundation for the Blind in New Zealand. These two panels travelled the country with the exhibition and local embroiderers worked on them at each stop. The main exhibition has now returned to Walton-on-Thames, the location of the Mt Felix Hospital. The two additional panels are now finished and will be sent to Walton-on-Thames to be stretched and framed and then displayed with the other panels.

Rosemary Burnby, who coordinated the Mt Felix Tapestry tour of New Zealand, kindly brought the two finished panels to Dunedin on the Sunday before Christmas and displayed them at the Otago Settlers Museum. Here is a photograph of them.

OEG EXHIBITION 2020 PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE

The Power of Poetry

Embroider a line or lines from a published poet and then embroider your interpretation to represent the imagery in the lines. The piece must be titled – An extract from (title of the poem) by (poet).

This can be presented in different ways to fit within a 5-inch (13cm) by 8-inch (20cm) radius. It can be much smaller provided it fits within the measurements provided. It could be a plaque, or a needle case, or a small box or a little book. That is entirely your choice.

e.g., An extract from 'Hunger' by Laurence Binyon

I am Hunger

Embroider examples of physical, mental or spiritual hunger.

Or

An extract from 'To Autumn' by John Keats

Seasons of mist and mellow fruitfulness

Close bosom friend of the maturing sun

Embroider images of autumn literally or figuratively.

Children's poetry, humorous poetry and NZ poetry are wonderful sources of inspiration.
