## A message from our president, Mary Flaherty

It is now seven weeks since we went into lockdown. Covid-19 has had a resounding effect on the world, its countries, its regions, its communities and to individuals. 'Stay safe and stay at home' has had a huge impact on each and everyone's normal activities and has provided us time to think and change many of our ways of doing even the simplest of tasks. Kevin and I have resorted to online shopping and like many of you wash our hands many times during the day and use sanitizer. At the beginning of lockdown a merino firm from Queenstown was making and sending merino masks free to anyone who wanted them and we were lucky enough to get one each. Like many of you we have our family living overseas and it will be sometime before we see them. So Whatsapp has been a very useful medium for us to keep in touch.

Even my teaching has had to adapt to new ways of learning. Last Saturday I had senior university students sit twelve Licentiate Teaching papers online and this Saturday will have two more Licentiate papers being sat. Seven weeks ago I started to teach online using Skype and Whatsapp and have really found it worked very well for theory exams. Shelley has prepared a reading/viewing list of interesting articles connected to embroidery and these have been emailed to you all each week. I have really enjoyed reading or viewing them. I resisted joining for a while as I am not interested in Facebook but eventually joined and can see how beneficial this medium is at this time for everyone. Di has kept us up to date with all communication coming in and going out. Sue has provided us with little embroideries to do especially over the Easter period and Aimee has continued her great work with Chainstitch. Other committee members have supported different members of the Guild. It is wonderful to hear our general members are keeping in contact with those on their own. Caring for one another is special at this time.

At this stage I am not sure when we will meet again. Social distancing is going to be required in Alert Level 2 and Alert Level 1. Our wonderful programme on 'Colour' for this year may extend into next year. We are still hoping our Exhibition will go ahead at the end of the year. So please

keep embroidering your entries. In fact, because my needle and thread come out each day I am surprised at how I am starting to move through some of my pieces I have had for some time.

There are three books / magazines ready to be put into the Guild Library. Inspirations No 105 has some beautiful projects ranging from silk embroidery to bead work to blackwork and lots of others. My favourite article was written by Ansie van de Walt about a lady called Widad Kawar who grew up in Bethlehem and studied in Ramallah. Widad has been collecting and recording the history of textiles that she buys from the owners and has written a book called Threads of Identity.

## **OEG EXHIBITION 2020 PRESIDENT'S CHALLENGE**

## The Power of Poetry

Embroider a line or lines from a published poet and then embroider your interpretation to represent the imagery in the lines. The piece must be titled – An extract from (title of the poem) by (poet). This can be presented in different ways to fit within a 5-inch (13cm) by 8-inch (20cm) radius. It can be much smaller provided it fits within the measurements provided. It could be a plaque, or a needle case, or a small box or a little book. That is entirely your choice.

For example, an extract from 'Hunger' by Laurence Binyon

"I am Hunger"

Embroider examples of physical, mental or spiritual hunger. Or, an extract from 'To Autumn' by John Keats

"Seasons of mist and mellow fruitfulness Close bosom friend of the maturing sun"

Embroider images of autumn literally or figuratively.

Children's poetry, humorous poetry and NZ poetry are wonderful sources of inspiration.
